

There Were 100 'Serious Risks' —Not Oswald

WASHINGTON—(UPI)—
At the time of John F. Kennedy's assassination, the Secret Service regarded 100 persons as "serious risk" to the life of the President.

It considered 12 to 15 more as "highly dangerous risks."

They were among approximately 400 persons throughout the country "subject to periodic review," the Warren Report said today.

Lee Harvey Oswald was not among them.

The names of potential risks are contained in the files of the Secret Service's Protective Research Section (PRS). Last November, there were approximately 50,000 cases accumulated over a 20-year period.
