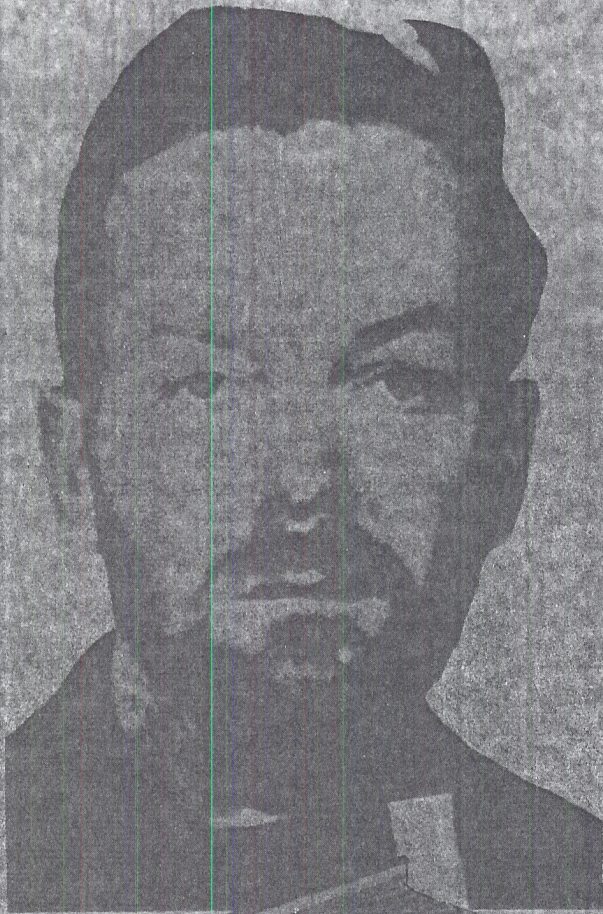
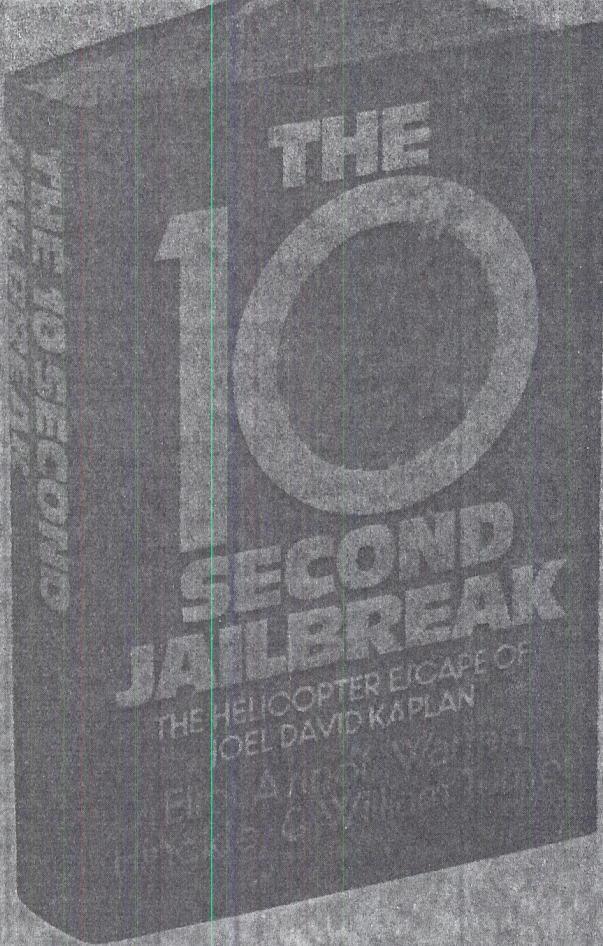


THE TEN-SECOND BREAK

Mystery, muckraking, human drama and sheer derling-do—this book has them all in good measure. The authors are well known: Hinckle as the former editor of *Saturday*, Turner (ex-FBI) as author of "Invisible Witness" and "J. Edgar Hoover and the FBI." As not for many books, their collective sympathies suggest a special interest in a possible CIA role in the astonishing "ten-second break" which is the climax of their narrative. An American businessman and one-time Caribbean gun runner named Lee David Kaplan was convicted by Mexican courts for the 1961 murder of his partner, Luis Vidal, Jr. Three others were either acquitted on the same evidence or released through diplomatic intercession. After serving a year in a Mexican prison, he sprang from Mexico's Acapulco Prison on August 18, 1971, by an intrepid pilot named Vic Stadler hired by Kaplan's brother. CIA-Cuban rightist overtones hang heavy over the narrative, which most will read as grandly entertaining suspense drama. Eight pages of photos. (May 1971)
