

GLOMAR EXPLORER TO SAIL AGAIN SOON

LOS ANGELES, April 10 — The Glomar Explorer, the ship that raised part of a Soviet submarine in the Pacific last year, will make another trip into the Pacific shortly, Corbett U. Allen, a vice president of Global Marine, Inc., said today.

Global Marine, in conjunction with Howard R. Hughes's Summa Corporation, operated the ship in the Central Intelligence Agency project that attempted to recover the sunken submarine northwest of Hawaii.

Mr. Allen, who is in charge of corporate planning for Global Marine, said that the vessel would leave her berth at Long Beach "around the end of the month" for a four-week cruise to an unspecified destination. He declined to state the purpose of the voyage, except to say that it was occasioned by "completion of modifications in the ship."

The Glomar Explorer suffered breakdown of some equipment in her submarine retrieval effort last August, during which she dropped the

larger portion of the Russian craft back to the ocean floor.

WASHINGTON, April 10 — Sources here said today that no decision had been reached on whether to allow the Glomar Explorer to try to retrieve the rest of the Soviet submarine.
