

Documents show Army spying in 1967-1968

WASHINGTON — The Army eavesdropped on radio communications among antiwar and other demonstrators six different times in 1967 and 1968 in apparent violation of the law, according to Army documents.

The eavesdropping, conducted by the Army Security Agency as part of the Army's plan for dealing with civil disturbances, began in October 1967 with the anti-Vietnam war march on the Pentagon and ended in September 1968 with the trial of Black Panther Huey Newton in Oakland.
