## Alliluyeva Letters Will Run in Times Beginning Sept. 10

The New York Times announced yesterday that it would advance publication of excerpts from Svetlana Alliluyeva's book, "Twenty Letters to a Friend," from October to September.

The 12 installments will run from Sept. 10 to 22. No installments will be published on Saturdays.

The dates were advanced at the request of some of the owners of the European serial rights, who expressed concern that portions of the book by the daughter of the late Josef Stalin had been leaked to unauthorized publishers.

Harper & Row also advanced the publication date of the book to Oct. 2 instead of Oct. 16.

Fritz Molden, president of the Molden Verlag of Vienna, worked out an agreement covering the European publishers with Collins, Knowlton & Wing, Mrs. Alliluyeva's literary agent, at a meeting here on Wednesday.

Life Magazine, which will print two installments from the book, said yesterday they would now be published in the issues dated Sept. 15 and 23 instead of in a single issue on Oct. 13, as previously planned.

### British Advance Date, Too

LONDON, Aug. 10—The British publishers of Mrs. Alliluyeva's memoirs, the Hutchinson publishing group, announced tonight they would bring out the book Oct. 2 instead of Oct. 16, as originally planned.

Robert Lusty, managing director, said: "We would not want the United States' editions circulating round before we had published."
