

Russ Say CIA Ghosted Svetlana's

MOSCOW — (AP) — A Soviet magazine charges the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency ghost-wrote the memoirs of Svetlana Alliluyeva, Stalin's daughter.

The monthly scientific and political magazine, International Life, said the CIA also is backing a group to distribute "anti-Soviet" literature in Russia.

It named imprisoned authors Andrei D. Sinyavsky and Yuli M. Daniel as among those whose banned works the group plans to distribute. Of the memoirs of Mrs. Al-

liluyeva, the magazine said, "Many press organs in the West suppose that they were fabricated by ghost writers for the CIA."

Memoirs

The memoirs, the article added, would be disseminated in Russia to spoil the 50th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution Nov. 7.
