## Wallace Discloses He Ignored '72 Tip By Secret Service

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WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (UPI) —Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama said today that he ignored Secret Service advice not to appear at the Maryland shopping center rally where he was shot while campaigning in 1972.

In a statement read by a Wallace aide to a Senate Appropriations subcommittee, Gov. Wallace said that in the future he would accede to the judgment of Secret Service agents assigned to protect him. The subcommittee is reviewing protection for the President and political candidates.

"I will make one commitment to the future, however, and that is if I am ever afforded Secret Service protection again, I will do my best to follow their advice," he said in his statement. "They had advised me against appearing in shopping center-type rallies in 1972."

Mr. Wallace was paralyzed by the shooting, for which Arthur H. Bremer was convicted.

His statement was read by Col. E. C. Dothard, director of the Alabama Department of Public Safety, who was wounded in the same incident.

The colonel said Mr. Wallace had agreed to "stay away from uncontrolled" campaign appearances in the future because "you lose control completely when you go into crowded situations."

Mr. Wallace, who has not yet announced whether he will run for President in 1976, has accepted an offer from the Treasury Department to use Secret Service agents during the 1976 campaign.
