Nixon-Haldeman - Personal involvement by both in postcard poll aimed at undermining support for Gov. Edmund G. Brown, in Nixon 1962 campaign for governor of California. Neither Nixon nor Haldeman were defendants in subsequent lawsuit, but judgement by Judge Byron Arnold, 30 Oct 64, ruled that the postcard poll was amended and finally approved by Nixon personally, and that Nixon and Haldeman approved the plan and project.

McCord to have been sentended today (see entry 23 Mar). His lawyer, Gerald Alch, asks Sirica for 30-day delay in sentencing to allow McCord to talk to senators on E_rvin committee and to the grand jury; Sirica grants delay until 15 Jun. Gallup poll, taken during this period, "shows a further decline[in Nixon's popularity], with 59 per cent take expressing approval of the way he is handling the job. This percentage compares with 65 per cent in a mid-February survey and a high point of 68 per cent in January, recorded during a time of profound relief among Americans following the Vietnam peace settlement.

"Interestingly the Watergate affair has yet to emerge as a significant source of dissatisfaction with the President's performance in office."
