Ellsberg trial - In memo dated today and filed with Judge Byrne (no date, but made public 10 May) Ruckelshaus, acting director of the FBI, says that on 4 May he "initiated an investigation to interview present and retired FBI personnel for the purpose of determining, if possible, where there had been any [taps of Ellsberg's phone calls];" that on 8 May he received a "preliminary report" that a former FBI employee recalled that in late 1969 and early 1970 Ellsberg calls had been tapped from Morton Halperin residence.
