Under previous name three of its top officials were indicted in 1968 for distributing false financial statements and mail fraud; the three were fined a total of \$17,000, did not go to jail; unconditional pardon granted by Nixon 20 Dec 72.

In the audit Rebozo is named as the secret partner of Abplanalp in the B & C Investment Co., which handled the financial arrangements; no indication that B & C had any other business.
