Mr. Nixon, at that point, had ruled out any future access to the tapes by the courts or grand jury and was unwilling to allow independent verification* by an outside party of the accuracy of his version of what the tapes contained. The Justice Department then entered into negotiations with the White House, and Attorney General Richardson tried to persuade the President not to fire Cox, according to the sources."
