Nixon (Watergate mistakes) - "Not only has her father overcome what she called the 'depression' he suffered after leaving the Presidency, said Julie Nixon Eisenhower, but he is also hard at work on the Watergate chapters of what she promised would be a 'very candid' book about his Administration. Interviewed on the 'Today' show [today], Mrs. Eisenhower said of Richard M. Nixon: 'I think it was very normal to be depressed. I think the whole country was depressed.'

"Asked whether her father had 'repented' any mistakes he might have [made] in the Watergate affair, she replied, 'He's honest with himself and he knows he made mistakes, but I'm not going to repent for him. He's a great man. He can admit his mistakes.'"

Henry E. Petersen - William G. Hundley says Petersen, Assistant U.S. Attorney until he retired 31 Dec 74, will join the firm of Hundley and Cacheris after 1 Jan 76.

Petersen was Hundley's deputy when the latter was chief of the organized crime section of the Justice Department.

Hundley (with Cacheris?) was Mitchell's lawyer in Mitchell-Stans-Vesco-Sears case, and in Watergate cover-up trial. When Mitchell hired him 20 Apr 73, "press reports" described Hundley and Petersen as close personal friends (Congressional Quarterly, Watergate, p. 20).

Hundley (with Cary Mark Feldman) is Nixon's lawyer in suit brought against him by Morton Halperin (entry 28 Apr 75, Nixon, Halperin suit).
