## The Major Events of the Day

### International

Military officers petitioned President Francisco da Costa Gomes to end what they view as efforts by Premier Vasco Goncalves to turn Portugal into a Communist state on Eastern European lines. The petition's sponsors claimed 90 per cent support in the armed forces. It was drawn up by nine officers suspended Saturday as members of the High Council of the Revolution for creating divisions within the armed forces. The widespread and often violent campaign to oust the Premier and the four-day-old Cabinet picked up speed. [Page 1, Column 8.]

Black and white leaders of Rhodesia announced after nearly 10 years of stalemate that they would meet within two weeks to discuss a new constitution for the racially divided country. The talks will start in railway cars on a bridge over the Zambezi River forming the border between Rhodesia and black-controlled Zambia. White-ruled South Africa has been applying heavy pressure to the white Rhodesian Government of Prime Minister Ian D. Smith to reach a settlement and end the small but growing guerrilla war south of the Zambezi. [1:7.]

The elders of the town of Oberammergau in West Germany have decreed that the next enactment of the passion play in 1980 will not use a text that has been sharply criticized for blaming Jews for the death of Christ. The new script will ascribe the condemnation and crucifixion of Christ to Lucifer, the fallen angel of evil. A majority of the town council voted to give up the century-old text and revert to a 1750 version which will need some modernization of the language and new music. [1:5-6.]

### National

The Army disclosed that a 42-year-old patient at the New York State Psychiatric Institute died in an Army-sponsored experiment with hallucinogenic drugs in January, 1953. Elizabeth Barrett, a Manhattan widow, said that the man was Harold Blauer, her father, a tennis professional. She said that she was sure the drug was LSD, but the Army indicated that the patient had been given derivatives of mescaline. She said that she had been told the fatal dose was administered over her father's objection the day before he was to be discharged. A heart attack was given as the cause. [1:5-6.]

### Urban police departments are increasingly using civilians in many positions. Figures collected by the Federal Bureau of Investigation show that the percentage of civilians has increased from 7 per cent in 1970 to 13.2 per cent in 1972. A study by the Urban Institute projects further sharp increases, explained by the desire of police managers to free officers for "critical" functions. [1:1-2.]

### Metropolitan

The asserted kidnappers of Samuel Bronfman 2d, the 21-year-old son of the head of the billion-dollar Seagram Company, Ltd., were reported to be demanding a \$4.5-million ransom. A law-enforcement source also indicated there was some "bizarre" aspect that might involve the way in which the youth was being detained. A spokesman for the family said he had been queried about reports that the ransom letter wanted that the young man had only a 10-day supply of air and water. He said he did not know the conditions set forth in the letter but that the family had complied with one of the instructions in it. [1:1-2.]

Eight former officials and employees of the Franklin National Bank and its parent company, the Franklin New York Corporation, have been indicted on Federal charges involving the loss of more than \$30-million of its money in unauthorized speculation in foreign currencies. The indictment was unsealed following the arrest of Peter R. Shadick, the former executive vice chairman of the bank and former director of the corporation. The insolvent bank's assets were purchased by the European-American Bank and Trust Company. [1:3.]

Governor Carey signed the bill restricting the State Commission of Correction as a full-time, three-member body and nominated Herman Schwartz, a University of Buffalo law professor and former assistant district attorney in Buffalo, as its chairman. Critics of the prison system praised the appointment. Mr. Schwartz was a member of the observer team at the Attica uprising in 1971 and had been unpaid counsel to several inmates before the riot. Governor Carey signed the measure making the beaver New York's state animal. Noting objections from Oregon which earlier adopted the animal, Mr. Carey called it indigenous to New York State and said it was admitted for quiet industriousness and perseverance. [1:6-8.]
