

Watergate-- McCord to Talk to Press

Watergate conspirator James W. McCord Jr. said yesterday he is anxious that the full story of the Democratic headquarters break-in be told and that he will talk to newsmen before he appears again at a Senate hearing.

The former security chief of President Nixon's reelection committee, convicted of conspiracy, burglary and wiretapping, spent much of the day before a grand jury after receiving immunity for his testimony.

He was the last of the seven Watergate defendants to be brought before the grand jury, which is continuing its look into the June 17 burglary and other possible political espionage in the 1972 campaign.

The promise of a news conference, to follow McCord's grand jury appearance and completion of a deposition in Watergate civil suits, was made by McCord and his lawyer, Bernard Fensterwald.

Fensterwald said McCord

will talk with newsmen before the Senate committee on Watergate holds its first open hearing, likely to be at the end of next week.

Such a conference seems likely to irk senators who seek the first public disclosures in their own forum.

McCord, who was found guilty after a four-week trial in January, is to be sentenced June 15 and Judge John J. Sirica made clear that his cooperation with Watergate probes would be a factor in the sentence.

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
