Casey Says He Did Not Know Of Any Mishandling on Vesco

WASHINGTON, May 17 (UPI) — Under Secretary of State William J. Casey said today that he had no knowledge of any wrongdoing in the Securities and Exchange Commission's handling of a fraud case against Robert L. Vesco when Mr. Casey was S.E.C. chairman. Mr. Vesco is a New Jersey financier

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Mr. Casey, who is on a Latin-American tour with Secretary of State William P. Rogers, issued a statement through the State Department a day after his successor as S.E.C. chairman, G. Bradford Cook, resigned.

Mr. Cook resigned in the wake of allegations that he had deleted references to a secret \$200,000 contribution to President Nixon's re-election campaign from a commission complaint against Mr. Vesco.

Mr. Casey said he had no intention of resigning from the State Department.

Mr. Cook was general counsel of the S.E.C. at the time of the Vesco investigation, which resulted in a civil indictment against Mr. Vesco and others for allegedly looting \$224-million from four mutual funds.

In his statement, Mr. Casey said that he had been aware of the S.E.C. investigation, but that he had had no knowledge shat \$250,000 involved in the case was actually an unreported contribution to President Nixon's re-election campaign.
