Cool It, Agnew Tells GOP

Vice President Spiro T. Agnew told Republicans yesterday they must guard against "being stampeded into protesting entirely too much" about their party's involvement in the

Watergate affair.
"It is understandable that those of us who are subjected to the incessant drum beat of publicity given to Watergate tend to feel coerced by the seeming weight of it all and to crope anew each day for

ever stronger words of condemnation and disassociation from alleged and insinuated wrongdoing, lest we be thought to protest too little." the Vice President

Speaking to a Juncheon meeting of the Bull Ele-phants Club. Agnew urged caution and told Republi-cans that their party's ideals still stand still stand.

"Republicans must not allow the content of their speeches, statements, and even private conversations

to be controlled by those who are literally obsessed with one subject. Agnew said.

He said some of those ob-sessed with Watergate have never wished the Republican party anything but ill and have never liked President NIXOL.

"It's time, gentlemen, that we went back to work" Agnew said, asserting the Nixon administration is pre-pared to offer solutions to the real, as opposed to the minufactured problems of our times." Associated Press
