Probers Get Lists Of Nixon's Donors

Secret lists of early contributors to President Nixon's 1972 re-election campaign have been sent to the Senate Watergate committee, the special Watergate prosecution force and the U.S. attorney's office which is investigating the contributions made by financier Robert L. Vesco.

Kenneth Parkinson, a lawyer for the Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President said yesterday he had agreed to turn the lists over to the New York investigation and to the special Watergate prosecutor, Archibald Cox.

Mitchell Rogovin, general counsel for Common Cause, the citizens' lobby, said the same lists had been turned over to the staff of the Senate committee.

The lists, 1½ inches thick, show contributions of \$1000 or more; the total is believed to be \$19.6 million. The contributions were given to the re-election campaign before April 7, 1972.

That was when a new election law went into effect, requiring a listing of all campaign expenditures and contributions.
