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The high point of Kalmbach's testimony occurred in the afternoon, when the committee's chairman, Senator Sam Ervin, introduced the transcript of a telephone conversation between Kalmbach and Ehrlichman made on April the 19th, 1973, the day before Kalmbach was to appear before the Watergate grand jury. The transcript was submitted to the committee, under subpoena, by Ehrlichman. The conversation was, incidentally, taped by Ehrlichman and in part went as follows.

E: Well, I don't know of any attempts to target you at all. My hunch is that they're trying to get at me, they're trying to corroborate. See, what they said to Dean is that he gets no consideration from them unless they can corroborate Haldeman and my liabilities.

K: God, if I can just make it plain that it was just humanitarian and nothing else.

E: Yeah, at the point that I undoubtedly never expressed to you that I continually operated on the basis of Dean's representations to me.

K: Yes, it was not improper.

E: Right.

K: And there was nothing illegal about it.

E: See - he's the house lawyer.

K: Yes, exactly. And
