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**Nixon Seen Resuming  
Schedule Next Week**

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President Nixon's doctors reported yesterday that he was "essentially a well man" and could resume an almost full-time work schedule next week.

All medication has been stopped and the President will leave Bethesda naval hospital Friday for a weekend at Camp David. Dr. Walter R. Tkach said after examining the President.

An afternoon bulletin said that Mr. Nixon "walked briskly to the elevator" to get a final chest X ray. "The pneumonia appears completely resolved and he continues to show progressive improvement," the bulletin said.

Dr. Tkach noted that the President "tolerated a rather long appointments schedule" Tuesday "without untoward effects."

Mr. Nixon will continue to experience fatigue for another week or so and should rest an hour in the morning and again in the afternoon, the doctor said.

On Tuesday, the President will participate in the usual welcoming ceremony on the South Lawn for a foreign leader when he greets the Shah of Iran. In the evening, the President will give a state dinner for the Shah.

White House press secretary

Ronald L. Ziegler said that the President said "he wants to carry out as full a schedule as possible next week."

After conferring with a number of official visitors Tuesday, Mr. Nixon yesterday worked alone or with staff assistants.

Ziegler said that the President spent part of the time in bed and part of the time in a living room adjoining his bedroom.

When asked if a photographer or newsman would be allowed to see the President briefly, Ziegler said: "You will be able to observe him when he leaves" the hospital Friday to take a helicopter for Camp David.

Ziegler said no time had been set for the meeting the President has agreed to have with Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., chairman of the Senate Watergate investigating committee.
