Haldeman May Become A Defendant

An attorney for 14 young persons thrown out of a presidential appearance here two years ago raised the possibility yesterday of adding former presidential chief of staff H. R. Haldeman to the list of defendants in a \$840. of defendants in a \$840,-000 damage suit.

"The longer Watergate goes on, the more enticing the possibility gets," aftorney George S. Daly Jr. said.

If Haldeman is sued, Daly said, other former White House officials may be called as witnesses.

RULING

Daly's comments came one day after U.S. District Judge James B. McMillan ruled that the Secret Service may not bar dissidents from presidential appearances in the country, unless they provide an immediate threat to the President's life.

The injunction issued Tuesday applies nationally because it came in a class action suit.

McMillan said preliminary testimony indicated there was a "wholesale assault upon the civil rights and liberties of numerous citizens" on Oct. 15, 1971, when Mr. Nixon appeared here for Billy Graham day ceremonies.

WATERGATE

The same event figured prominently in yesterday's testimony before the Senate Watergate committee when Senator Lowell P. Weicker (Rep-Conn.) produced a memo on which Haldeman had written "good" and great" next to notations predicting violent and profane demonstrations here.
