a lawyer need not be known by the clients he keeps, but he can be self-described by what he elects to say about them. One of Wilson's clients of several days ago was one Joseph P. Kamp, an American equivalent of a Nazi. To the Anti-Defamation League, Kamp was a "notorious anti-semitic." When Kamp was tried for contempt of Congress Wilson's defense (successful) included describing Kamp as of "true, fine character" and "an upright citizen." But all Wilson claims to have known of Kamp is "I knew he was very very strongly anti-Communist." This standard would make those who stoked the gas ovens at Auschwitz and others from Hitler down "upright citizens" who enjoyed "true, fine character."

Even Kamp ran a commercialization of Communism-nating that included labor unions and leaders as Communists. He called it the "Constitutional Educational League." Work Fifteen years before he was tried for contempt before another committee, he was investigated by the committee for which I worked. We found him to be a faker and a fraud.

Scholarly, soft-spoken Mormon Senator Albert D. Thomas questioned Kamp about the Constitutional Educational League and its activities and propaganda. Extensively and patient high-falutin name he gave his outfit! It turned out that Kamp could hardly have known less about the Constitution or education or to have been less qualified to say anything about it. Thomas concluded that Kamp's "Constitutional Educational League" was "Not Constitutional, not educational, but might be a league."
