Delay In the Hearings

An alleged campaign spy known as "Fat Jack" and Dwight Chapin, President Nixon's former appointments secretary, have refused to testify before the Senate Watergate committee, delaying resumption of the hearings until Wednesday.

Sam Dash, chief counsel for the committee, said yesterday Chapin and John R. Buckley had been scheduled to testify tomorrow, but the committee decided not to call them when they said they would invoke the Fifth Amendment in response to all questions.

He identified Buckley as "Fat Jack."

As a result, Dash said, the committee will not resume hearings until Wednesday when the witness is expected to be Donald H. Segretti, an admitted political saboteur for Mr. Nixon's 1972 reelection campaign.

The first public reference to "Fat Jack" occurred in committee hearings last week when Watergate conspirator E. Howard Hunt was questioned by Senator

Lowell Weicker (Rep.Conn.) about spying efforts on behalf of the White House.

Hunt said a man he knew only as "Fat Jack" last year hired an unidentified person to spy on Senator Edmund S. Muskie's campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Buckley, 53, is a former FBI agent who retired last June 30 as chief of the inspection division of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Chapin, who now works for United Air Lines in California, has been identified as the White House aide who hired Segretti to conduct political espionage and sabotage.
