

What You Can Do

1. Know exactly what "impeachment" means. Become an expert on the process itself.
2. Concentrate on your congressional district. Remember, your Representative has one of the 218 votes necessary to impeach.
3. Write your Representative. Do not avoid responsibility by assuming that he or she is against the idea or automatically will support it and will not be affected by your views. Express them anyway. Get your friends to do the same. Send copies of your Representative's reply to the ACLU Washington National Office (address below). We will tabulate and use them.
4. Most Representatives have local offices—go there and urge action.
5. Write letters to all your local and area daily and weekly newspapers. Do not omit them because they are "conservative" or "Republican" or for any other reason. This issue crosses party lines and ideologies.
6. Give talks to other groups to which you belong.
7. Help your chapter and affiliate operate a speaker's bureau. Arrange speakers for every possible club, group or other meeting (schools and PTA's will want to conduct debates).
8. Hold seminars and workshops on impeachment. Urge the public to attend.
9. Insist that your Representative meet with you and others. Hold coffees in private homes. Organize your neighborhood. Start with your own block.
