# SHULTZ SAYS NIXON GAVE MILK ORDER

### Asserts White House Feared Congress Would Approve an Even Bigger Increase

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 — Secretary of the Treasury George P. Shultz said today that the Nixon Administration had reversed its own experts, in 1971, and ordered a large increase in the support price for milk because the Administration was afraid Congress would legislate an even bigger increase.

It was clear that Congress would act, he said, because the milk industry had mounted a tremendous lobbying effort on the issue.

The increase in the support price for milk that is paid by the Government has been estimated to have added more than \$500-million to the income of dairy farmers and the prices paid by consumers.

Lawsuits and internal White House memorandums have linked the grant of the increase to pledges of campaign contributions from the milk producers of as much as \$2-million. Mr. Shultz said he was sure that the milk producers had Continued on Page 11, Column 1
