Dr. Thomas W. Matthew, the neurosurgeon who won powerful support at the White House for his advocacy of "black capitalism," was sentenced yesterday to three years in prison for having misapplied Medicaid

Justice Thomas Agresta, sitting in State Supreme Court in Kew Gardens, Queens, stayed execution of the sentence for 60 days to permit an appeal, for which Dr. Matthew has engaged a noted constitu-tional lawyer, Herald Price Fahringer of Buffalo.
