## Vote for President In 1974 Is Backed

By 50 to 36 per cent. Americans would favor holding a "special election for President in 1974, if the Supreme Court found it was constitutional." By 53 to 37 per cent, a majority agrees with the statement that "because public confidence has been so shaken in the White House, a special election for President would clear the air and give the country a new start."

It has been suggested that such a special election might be in order if a Vice President not elected by the entire country — such as Gerald Ford — were to succeed to the presidency. This possibility could be come a reality if President Nixon were to resign or were impeached. In that case, Ford would become President and could ask Congress to call a special election if there were judged to be no constitutional obstacles.

It is by no means a foregone conclusion that a Democrat would be elected President in such an election. In
recent Harris Survey trial
runs for the 1976 election,
Ford ran slightly ahead of
both Sen. Edward M. Kennedy and Sen. Henry M. Jackson, two of the most frequently mentioned Democratic
presidential prospects.

Recently, the Harris Survey asked a cross-section of 1,496 households across the country:

It has been suggested that it might be proper under the Constitution for Congress to call an election for President in 1974. The person elected would serve until the regular election in 1976. If the U.S. Supreme Court found it was constitutional to have a special election for President in 1974, would you favor or oppose such a step?
