John D. Ehrlichman, former domestic adviser to President Nixon, is in Washington this week on what his lawyer has called a "significant" visit.

Mr. Ehrlichman resigned from the White House staff April 30 and returned to Seattle to practice law, He has since made a number of trips to Washington and has appeared before one of the grand juries investigating the Watergate scandals.

John J. Wilson, Mr. Ehrlichman's lawyer, said the former White House aide arrived Sunday and planned to leave Saturday.

Mr. Ehrlichman has been indicted under California laws in a burglary-conspiracy case that grew out of a break-in in September, 1971, at the Beverley Hills office of Dr. Lewis F. Fielding. Dr. Fielding, a psychiatrist, had treated Dr. Daniel Ellsberg, central figure in the Pentagon Papers trial. The burglars sought files on Dr. Ellsberg.
