## Witness Says Agnew Got Road Contract Kickbacks

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BALTIMORE, Jan. 23 — A former Maryland Roads Comformer Maryland Roads Commission chairman testified in Federal Court here today that he was involved in the extortion of cash kickbacks from 1967 to 1969 with former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew and a Baltimore mortgage banker.

The witness, Jerome B. Wolff, 55 years old, served as commission chairman while Mr. Agnew was Governor of Maryland

Mr. Wolff's description of the alleged kickbacks came on the 10th day of a political corruption trial of N. Dale Anderson, Baltimore County Executive. Mr. Wolff said that most of the Kickbacks took place while Mr. Agnew was Governor but that some payments were made after he became Vice President.

Mr. Wolff's testimony before the seven-man, five-woman jury provided new details on information described in a 40-page statement of evidence made public by Federal prosecutors on Oct. 10, the day Mr. Agnew pleaded no contest to a tax violation and resigned as vice President.

That statement said that seven unnamed engineering concerns and an unnamed financial institution were victims of the extortion plan, but no money figures were given. Today, Mr. Wolff, who is testify ing under a grant of limited immunity, said that nine engineering concerns and a financial institution were involved.

Mr. Wolff, who began testifying Monday afternoon, said, under cross-examination by Norman P. Ramsey, Mr. Anderson's attorney, that Mr. Hammerman, a long-time Agnew associate, came to him early in 1967 with the plan to extort kickbacks.

What he called the "state road commission arrangement" actually was given to him after he joined the Vice President's staff in 1969, Mr. Wolff testified. He was appointed roads chairman in March, 1967, five months fter Mr. Agnew in Washington. The witness said that the \$10,000 was in "residual" kickbacks from contracts awarded before he left the state roads chairmanship.

He also testified that Mr. Agnew had dealt directly with officials from two concerns seeking state roads contracts. These officials were identified by Mr. Wolff as Lester Matz. Childs & Associates, Inc., and Green, president of Green & Associates.
