The House Judiciary Committee is expected to approve today and send to the House a resolution asserting its constitutional power to obtain infor-mation from any source, in-cluding the President, for its impeachment inquiry of President Nixon.

It would be in line with a statement made Tuesday by Rep. Edward Hutchinson (R-Mich.), senior Republican on the Judiciary Committee, that the President cannot assert executive privilege to withhold information from the committee's impeachment inquiry.

If approved by the committee and the House, the resolu-tion would empower the committee by subpoena or otherwise to obtain testimony in person or by sworn statement from "any person" it deems necessary. Committee members there are no plans to call Mr. Nixon to testify in person.

The resolution is intended to equip the committee with power to obtain documents from the White House, which has been equivocal whether it would coo as to whether it would cooperate, and from Jaworski, who has indicated that secrecy require-ments of Watergate grand jury proceedings prevent him from handing over his files voluntarily.

The committee already has subpoena power for matters within its specific jurisdiction. But the impeachment power is vested in the House as a whole, and the committee felt it needed formal action by the House delegating subpoena power for the impeachment inquiry to the committee.

The resolution also would give formal authority by the full House to the committee's inquiry into whether Mr. Nixon should be impeached (indicted) and removed from (indicted) and removed from office for Watergate or other actions.
