

Julie Gaining After Surgery

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 15 (AP)—Julie Nixon Eisenhower was reported doing well today, even walking a bit, the day after undergoing emergency major surgery to remove a benign ovarian cyst.

The two Indiana University medical school doctors who performed the 44-minute operation checked on their patient early today and found Mrs. Eisenhower's condition to be "satisfactory."

Assistant White House physician William Lukash, who came here with Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Pat Nixon, also checked on Julie and reported she was "doing fine."

The doctors said President

Nixon's younger daughter "had experienced some pain and nausea during the night . . . but was able to tolerate a short walk in the room without difficulty."

Mrs. Eisenhower was expected to spend her entire convalescence at the hospital, a period the doctors say may be a week to 10 days.

Her husband, David Eisenhower, and her mother occupied adjoining suites on the hospital's sixth floor executive wing. They visited the 25-year-old patient during the night and today.

At Key Biscayne, Fla., where President Nixon was spending the weekend, presi-

dential press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said that the reports from the hospital were that "Julie is progressing in a satisfactory way."

He said the President talked to his ailing daughter briefly after her operation Thursday evening.

Hospital spokesmen said the operation involved an abdominal incision but that removal of the cyst did not require removal of the ovary itself.

The attending doctors would not discuss whether the operation would impair Mrs. Eisenhower's capacity to bear children. Hospital spokesman Harrison Ullman said: "All I can say is the doctors with whom I

talked this morning appeared to be very happy and confident."

Previously, Dr. Cory SerVaas, whose husband is board chairman of Curtis Publishing Co., where Mrs. Eisenhower is an assistant editor, had said she believed the operation would not affect the ability to bear children.
