Nixon Aid

John D. Ehrlichman's attorneys made it clear yesterday that they will seek dismissal of the California charges against him if President Nixon does not testify in his behalf.

"Mr. Nixon's testimony is in the largest sense necessary to insure the due process of law guaranteed by the 14th Amendment," Ehrlichman's lawyer said in a brief filed in the District of Columbia Superior Court. "Due process necessarily contemplates the production of all relevant evidence."

Ehrlichman is charged in the California case with conspiracy, burglary and perjury as a result of the September 1971 entry into the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist, Dr. Lewis Fielding.
