"I am proud to come to Venezuela to represent the Government and people of the United States for the inauguration of your newly elected President," Mrs. Nixon said. The inauguration is to take place tomorrow.

"Venezuela has given the world an example of peaceful elections in democracy and freedom," she continued. "I speak today for President Nixon and the American people in extending congratulations to all the Venezuelan people for your achievements."
