## Porter Gets 30-Day Term For Lying on Watergate

WASHINGTON, April 11—
Herbert L. Porter, a former aide in the re-election campaign of President Nixon, was sentenced today to 15 months in prison for lying to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in its Water-gate inquiry. But a Federal strict judge suspended all exept 30 days of the sentence. Tanned and relaxed, Mr. Porter stood calmly as Judge Willian B. Bryant pronounced the settence. Moments before Mr. Poter had told the judge:

"don't want to diminish my guilt However, I am absolutely positive in my heart, down to my thes, that I will never get into trouble again."

The sentence given Mr. Porter, who was scheduling director for the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, was the lightest for far of any of those conviced in the Watergate scands. He could have received maximum sentence of five/ears in prison plus a \$10,000 fe.
