Nixon Gets 60 Days for Tax Filing

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla., April 4 (UPI) — The Internal Reveue Service has given Presi-lent Nixon a "normal" 60-day xtension in filing his 1973 noome tax returns because of is back tax bill of almost half million dollars, the White Jourse said today.

Gerald L. Warren, Mr. Nix-m's deputy press secretary, aid the President was grant-d the "normal extension in iling time because of the searness of the Internal Reveiue Service ruling" that he rwes \$467,000 in back taxes and interest for returns be-ween 1969 and 1972.

Like all other American taxayers, Mr. Nixon faced a midnight deadline Monday for filng his 1973 income tax returns. Warren said Mr. Nixmis tax lawyers, Kenneth mill and H. Chapman Rose, had requested the exension. There has been unconfirmed speculation that he may have to pay as much as \$100,000 on last year's income.
On April 3, the IRS and the congressional Joint Committee in Internal Revenue Taxation affect that Mr. Nixon owed the mark tax naments. pack tax payments, primarily because deductions for the gift vice presidential papers and his real estate properties had been disallowed. Within hours, the White House said the resident would pay the definquent tax bill.

The White House said in a statement that any "errors" in Mr. Nxion's returns were done without his knowledge and without his approval." Neither the IRS nor the congressional inquiry implicated Mr. Nixon of any fraud in the prepara-tion of his returns.
