

Nixon Returning From Florida

KEY BISCAIYNE, Fla., April 16—President Nixon was winding up his four-day Easter holiday in Florida today preparing to return to Washington.

He faced a new controversy over Watergate as Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski asked for a subpoena for 63 presidential conversations; he has not been able to get from the White House through negotiations.

The President's schedule this week is low-key. It includes a party for hemispheric diplomats Wednesday night and a speech to the Daughters of the American Revolution Thursday morning.

Mr. Nixon will entertain ministers of the Organization of American States, who are

in session this week discussing hemispheric problems, but he passed up an opportunity to address their sessions.

There was only routine business at the Florida White House during Mr. Nixon's stay.

Aides said the President kept in touch with negotiations on the Middle East and also reviewed reports of relief efforts in tornado disaster areas. He directed domestic adviser Kenneth Cole today to use all available federal resources to help out in Guin, Ala., where a shortage of mobile homes was affecting disaster victims.

The President called on federal agencies to begin plans to find summer jobs for young people. With some 105,000 summer jobs available in federal agencies, he urged particular emphasis on aiding needy youth.

And, issuing the annual Mothers Day proclamation for Sunday, May 12, the President noted that today's mothers are "as never before, moving into highly skilled jobs and careers." He said "barriers against equal opportunity for women have been disappearing rapidly, but we must remain diligent in our efforts to remove them."

The President and Mrs. Nixon flew to their Florida home Friday afternoon. Reportedly he has spent much of the time here relaxing with his family and with neighbor C. G. Bebe Rebozo. He made his only public appearance Sunday for Easter services at the Key Biscayne Community Church.
