

Judge Wants Any Evidence on Nixon

A federal judge ordered special prosecutor Leon Jaworski yesterday to give him and the defendants in the Ellsberg break - in case any evidence Jaworski might have about President Nixon's possible personal involvement.

U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell ordered Jaworski to respond by April 29 on whether Mr. Nixon might have authorized or known in advance of the Labor Day weekend, 1971, burglary attempt at the Beverly Hills, Calif., office of Pentagon Papers defendant Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Six members of the so-called White House "Plumbers" investigative unit were indicted last month on charges of conspiring to violate the civil rights of Ells-

berg's psychiatrist, Dr. Lewis J. Fielding.

Gesell ordered Jaworski to provide:

- Any "written instructions" from Mr. Nixon to any of the defendants or unindicted co-conspirators relating to the secret White House investigation of Ellsberg.

- Any transcripts of tapes "containing all instructions" by the President to members of the Plumbers team.

- Any press releases or other statements by Mr. Nixon subsequent to the break - in relating to the "authority or lack of authority for the raid.

- A statement of any information known about the "amount and source of any funds or materials" given the burglary team.
