

Nixon Flies To Arizona For Support

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 3 — President Nixon tonight carried his campaign against impeachment to this Republican stronghold, where an enthusiastic crowd shouted down groups of protesters.

The President, who flew here with two of the most influential Republicans in Congress, declared that he had furnished Congress "all the relevant evidence" on Watergate.

In his sole, brief mention of Watergate, he said, "The time has come to get Watergate behind us and to get on with the business of America."

During his speech he was interrupted many times by boos and shouts of disapproval, but an audience of more than 14,000 packed into the Phoenix Coliseum applauded the President enthusiastically.

The two principal Arizona Republicans in Congress, Sen. Barry Goldwater and Rep. John J. Rhodes, House minority leader, joined Gov. John R. (Jack) Williams in praising Mr. Nixon as a "great" President.

All the Republican members of the Arizona congressional delegation in Congress flew here with the President today.

Williams' invitation to the President and Mrs. Nixon, extended last month, was eagerly accepted as an opportunity for the President to speak in this Republican stronghold and in the company of Goldwater and Rhodes. Both at times have been critical of his Watergate stance.

However, Goldwater defended the President in talking to newsmen at Andrews Air Force Base just before leaving Washington.

Asked how Republicans have responded to publication of the edited White House tapes, Goldwater said: "I think it's become obvious that the Rodino com-
