He told a news conference that he reached this conclusion after reading the tran-scripts of the White House conversations between Nixon and his too aides concerning the possibility of paying hush money to the Watergate burglars.

"Like all inferences. don't have to draw it," he added.

Cox covered much of the same ground in the commencement speech he later made at the University of Virginia Coloral Colorad Col ginia Law School.

On both occasions, he said he believed there are three potential grounds for impeaching President Nixon.

The strongest, he said, would be if the question of providing White House tapes went to the Supreme Court and the President ignored an order of the court to relinquish them.

"Failure to comply would, in my judgment, be the most serious of impeachable offen-ses," the Harvard law profesimpeachable offensor said.
