Kennedy and Ford Lead As Contenders for '76

Senator Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts leads Vice President Gerald Ford, 50 to 39 per cent, in an early presidential trial heat between possible 1976 contenders. About one person in nine (11 per cent is undecided.

Kennedy is the top choice of Democratic voters for their party's nomination, as determined by a recent Gallup survey. Ford has a slight lead as the nomination choice of Republican voters, as determined by another survey conducted in early 1974.

Although Kennedy holds a

fairly wide margin over his potential rival at present, Ford's showing must be regarded as impressive in view of the fact that his party's popularity is currently at an all-time low. Only 24 per cent of U.S. voters classify themselves as Republicans, compared with 42 per cent who classify themselves as Democrats and 34 per cent who say they are independents.

In the current survey, Catholics give Kennedy a 65 to 25 per cent lead over Ford. Protestants choose Ford by 47 percent to 42 per cent.

Kennedy's current lead over Ford is accounted for

in large measure by the vote of non-whites, who choose him over Ford by a more than 9-to-1 ratio. In fact, if the current trial test findings were based on the choices of whites only, the vote would be extremely close.

Southern whites lean to Ford, 48 to 41 per cent, but Northern whites pick Kennedy by the margin of 47 to 41 per cent.

Kennedy has particular appeal to younger voters, between 18 and 29 years old, who choose him over Ford by about a 3-to-1 ratio.

Here are the questions asked in the survey to determine the relative popularity of presidential candidates at this early stage of the race for 1976:

"Suppose the presidential election were being held today. If Vice President Gerald Ford were the Republican candidate and Senator Edward Kennedy were the Democratic candidate, which would you like to see win?"

All those who indicated another preference or had no opinion were then asked:

"As of today, who do you lean more to, Ford or Kennedy?"

The latest trial-heat findings are based on the proportion (approximately 71 per cent) of the population who are currently registered to vote out of a total sample of 1543 adults, 18 and older. The survey was conducted in more than 300 localities during May 10-13.

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
