

# IMMUNITY GRANTED TO HUNT AND YOUNG

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)

—Two former White House aides, E. Howard Hunt Jr. and David R. Young, were given immunity today so that they could testify at next week's trial of Ellsberg break-in defendants.

Mr. Hunt and Mr. Young were named as unindicted co-conspirators in the 1971 break-in at the office of Dr. Daniel Ellsberg's former psychiatrist. Both had previously received immunity to testify before Watergate grand juries, but they stated in affidavits that unless they were given immunity for the trial they would invoke their Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination.

In a two-minute court session, Chief United States District Judge George L. Hart Jr. signed the immunity order, which means that nothing that Mr. Hunt and Mr. Young say can be used against them. The trial of John D. Ehrlichman, G. Gordon Liddy, Bernard L. Barker and Eugenio R. Martinez is scheduled to begin before United States District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell on June 26.

They are charged with conspiracy to violate the civil rights of Dr. Ellsberg's former psychiatrist, Dr. Lewis J. Fielding, by breaking into his office in search of information about Dr. Ellsberg. Mr. Ehrlichman, in addition, will be tried on four counts of perjury.
