## Watergate Coverage Believed 'Too Much'

PRINCETON, N.J. - A majority of Americans, 53 per cent, believe the mass media - newspapers, television and radio - are providing "too much" coverage of Watergate.

Four times as many in the current survey say "too much" as say "too little." Another 3 persons in 10 (30 per cent) believe the coverage of Watergate to be "about right."

The proportion who be-lieve Watergate coverage is in excess has increased from one year ago, when 44 per cent said the media was providing too much coverage, 12 per cent said too little and 36 per cent believed it to be "about right."

Here is the question asked: With regard to the Watergate affair, do you think the mass media—that is, newspa-pers, television and radio—
