Judge Barrington Parker yesterday denied mistrial motions sought by lawyers for California Lt. Gov. Ed Reinecke and ruled out calling nine witnesses for Reinecke's defense against charges he lied to a Senate committee.

Parker said he would rule on a companion motion to dismiss the charges when the trial resumes Monday.

Reinecke is charged with lying to the Senate Judiciary Committee about when he first told former Attor-

ney General John N. Mitchell about an ITT \$400,000 offer to finance the 1972 GOP convention.

Reinecke's lawyer, James E. Cox, argued for dismissal of charges on grounds that a former Watergate prosecutor did not adequately advise Reinecke of his rights during an interview with government lawyers. Cox also said the transcripts of Reinecke's Senate testimony were faulty and that there was no grounds for the government case.

Parker, ruled that Cox

could not call several witnesses he had scheduled to testify unless it were shown that the witnesses would be crucial to the defense case. Among the witnesses ruled out were Watergate Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski, former Attorney General Richard G. Kleindeinst and columnist Jack Anderson.

The prosecution rested its perjury case Friday after reading grand jruy testimony intended to show Reinecke had lied about the date he first told Mitchell of the ITT offer.
