

Suspect to Be Arraigned
For Draft Evasion in 1953

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23 (AP)—A San Diego man, indicted by a Federal grand jury 20 years ago for draft evasion, will be arraigned here on those charges next Monday.

Federal Bureau of Investigation agents said that Miguel Unberto Franco told them yesterday he was "glad to get it over with."

The 41-year-old construction worker faces a maximum five-year sentence and a \$10,000 fine if convicted of failing to report for induction as ordered by the Salinas draft board on Feb. 9, 1953.

Federal officials said a Federal grand jury indicted Mr. Franco on the draft charge in San Francisco on Oct. 21, 1954.

Charles W. Bates, special F.B.I. agent in charge, said that Mr. Franco had been born in King City, Calif., of Mexican parents and moved to Mexico in 1952, claiming the privileges of Mexican citizenship as a result of his parentage.
