Martha Mitchell's Son Is Married

Tylertown, Miss.

Outspoken Martha Mitchell bubbled with joy yesterday over the wedding of her son from a previous marriage, saying she just adores her new daughter-in-law and couldn't have done better if she had picked her out herself.

All 1700 residents of Tylertown were invited to the social event of the little town's season, the wedding of Janis Crawford, 22, and Jay Jennings, 26, son of the wife of former U.S. Attorney General John Mitchell.

The couple almost had to tie the knot without Martha. The car taking her to the church had a flat tire on the way, but was quickly backed down a freeway service ramp on the rim and a service station attendant put on the spare.

The couple plans to live in Washington, D.C., where Jennings will work for the Senate Armed Services Committee.

"The church was lovely and we had such a luscious day, simply beautiful," the ebullient Mrs. Mitchell said after the reception at the home of the parents of the bride, Dr. and Mrs. Ben Crawford of Tylertown.

Tylertown residents gathered in the Crawford's front yard to see Mrs. Mitchell leave the reception, applauding and yelling "Yea Martha."

Mrs. Mitchell claimed more credit for helping to uncover the Watergate scandal and was pleased with what happened since.

"It's the best thing that ever happened to this country," she said. "We're going to get all the politicians real true blue again."

She told reporters that she opposed amnesty to anyone involved in Watergate, but was in favor of amnesty for Vietnam war resisters.

Mrs. Mitchell said she is writing a book about her

years in Washington, especially the years of Watergate. "I'm just waiting until all the junk gets out so I can contradict it," she said.

Jennings' father, Clyde Jennings, a clothing manufacturer's representative in Jacksonville, Fla., did not attend his son's wedding, nor did the former attorney general appear.

She has sued Mitchell for legal separation. He goes on trial in the Watergate cover-up on September 30.
