Subpoena From Protesters  
Opposed by Nixon Lawyer

CHARLOTTE, N.C., Sept. 13 (AP)—An attorney for former President Richard M. Nixon has formally objected to a subpoena seeking materials from Mr. Nixon in connection with a Billy Graham Day rally here nearly three years ago.

The subpoena seeks documents and tape recordings dealing with security measures

taken during the rally at the Charlotte Coliseum on Oct. 15, 1971, from which Nixon protesters say they were wrongfully excluded.

Mr. Nixon's attorney, Raymond G. Larroca, entered his objection in a letter filed yesterday in Federal District Court in Charlotte. It was addressed to George Daly, attorney for 21 persons who have filed suit for a total of \$1,260,000 against H. R. Haldeman, former White

House chief of staff; two former White House advance men; the Secret Service, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Charlotte Police Department.

Mr. Larroca termed the subpoena "unreasonable and oppressive" in the time and expense that would be required in searching Presidential documents for material related to the visit. He also said the materials were privileged and not relevant to the pending lawsuit.
