Dole, Ex-G.O.P. Chairman, Challenged by Roy Bid for His Senate Seat **NYTimes**

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 5-Senator Robert J. Dole, a former Republican national chairman, sought re-election today against Representative William R. Roy, a Topeka obstetrician R. Roy, a Topeka obstetrician and lawyer.

Mr. Roy, a two-term Congressman, was the only Democrat in the state's five-man Congressional delegation.

In a race for the governorship, State Attorney General Vern Miller, a Democrat, opposed State Senator Robert F. Bennett, a Republican.

In the bitterly fought Senate campaign, Senator Dole told Kansas voters they would lose his potential power in Congress unless they returned him to Washington. He would be the ranking Republican on the Senate Agriculture Committee in

Agriculture Committee in the next session of Congress, he constantly reminded voters.

He also hammered away at what he called Mr. Roy's liberarilism, and linked the doctor to pro-abortion views and to what he termed the efforts of "leftwing" labor to "gain another Senator."

Representative Roy pointed to Senator Dole's relationship with former President Richard M. Nixon and attacked the Senator's Congressional record, saying it was out of step with the views of most Kansans, a charge that Mr. Dole also made against his opponent.
