

Watergate Figures Still In Prison

The release from prison of John W. Dean III, Jeb Stuart Magruder and Herbert Kalmbach leaves only three men serving Watergate-related sentences.

But some of the 49 persons convicted to date are still awaiting to begin serving prison terms or to resume terms interrupted by appeals.

Among those still in prison is Charles Colson, one time special counsel to former President Nixon, who began serving a one-to-three-year term last July 8.

The others are Harold Nelson, 56, of San Antonio, Tex., and David Parr, who began four-month terms on November 8 in the milk fund case.

Still awaiting sentencing in the Watergate coverup trial completed New Year's Day are John Mitchell, H.R. Haldeman, John Ehrlichman and Robert Mardian.

Ehrlichman also has a term of 20 months to five years pending for conviction in the plumbers' trial. Execution of the sentence was stayed while he appeals.

Among those yet to be sentenced are Frederick LaRue, who pleaded guilty in the coverup case in June 1973; Jack Gleason, who pleaded guilty in a campaign finance case; Jake Jacobsen, who pleaded guilty to paying a bribe in the milk fund case, and former Governor Tim Babcock of Montana, who pleaded guilty in a campaign contribution.

Of the original Watergate break-in defendants, James W. McCord, Jr., has still not served any of his one-to-five-year sentence; E. Howard Hunt Jr., G. Gordon Liddy and Bernard Barker, had their prison terms interrupted with appeals. The others, Virgilio Gonzalez, Eugenio Martinez and Frank Sturgis served their terms.

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
