F.A.A. REPORT ASKED ON AIR SAFETY RULES

WASHINGTON, March 2
(AP) — The chairman of the House Government Operations Committee called today for the Federal Aviation Administration to improve and enforce safety regulations for the air shipment of hazardous materials.

Representative Tech Providence

Representative Jack Brooks,
Democrat of Texas, sent a
letter to the F.A.A. Administrator, Alexander P. Butterfield,
asking for a report within two
weeks on what action the
agency had taken or intended
to take on a series of 16 recommendations of the National
Transportation Safety Board.
Meanwhile, the Air Line
Pilots Association, whose
members have been refusing to
fly planes carrying hazardous
cargoes since Feb. 1, issued a
statement protesting action by
the F.A.A. allowing Avon
Products to ship flammable
liquids and compressed gas by
air.

John J. O'Donnell, president of the association, charged that the waiver allowing Avon to ship those naterials was illegal.
