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## Ex-Aide to Humphrey Sentenced For Taking Illegal Contribution

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Jack L. Chestnut, the manager of Senator Hubert H.
Humphrey's 1970 senatorial campaign, was sentenced to four months in jail and fined \$5,000 yesterday for accepting an illegal corporate campaign contribution.

Mr. Chestnut, a prominent Minneapolis lawyer, became the first aide to a high Democratic politician to be convicted as a result of the Senate Watergate committee investigation.

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States Court House at Foley Square, said that he considered a prison sentence necessary "to protect the integrity of the political system against improper use of money."

Speaking at some length before sentencing, the Judge Weinfeld said that he had spent "soul-searching and agonizing hours" before deciding on Mr. Chestnut's sentence. To "insure that others will understand the seriousness of the violation," the judge said, he decided that imposing a fine would not be enough.

Mr. Chestnut, a senior partner in the firm of Chestnut, Brooks & Burkhardt, was convicted of having ararnged that \$12,000 in illegal contributions from Associated Milk Producers, Inc. be used to pay Mr. Humphrey's bills to a New York Advertising agency, Lennen & Newell, Inc.

Mr. Chestnut had contended that he was innocent of "willful" violation of the law and had asked the judge for acquittal on the grounds that evidence in the case was insufficient, that there was a lack of the state of Minnesota.

Mr. Chestnut remained free pending appeal.
