U.S. Women Greeted By Peking Officials

"Women hold up half the sky," according to one of Chairman Mao Tse-tung's "thoughts," and yesterday they seemed to be sustaining at least that share of American-Chinese interchange. Twelve members of the House arrived in Peking on what their leader Representative Margaret M. Heckler, Republican of Massachusetts, said was the first all-woman official American diplomatic mission.

Julie Nixon Eisenhower and her husband, David, who had arrived a day earlier, met with Foreign Minister Chiao Kuan-hua and other officials, including Tang Wen-sheng, also known as Nancy Tang, the Brooklyn-born interpreter for Chairman Mao who is a deputy director of the Foreign Ministry. Miss Tang was at the airport to meet the Congressional delegation.

Wang Hai-jung, an Assistant Foreign Minister who is Chairman Mao's niece, and who came to the United Nations in 1971, was among the officials at dinners given Monday for the Eisenhowers and yesterday for the Congressional delegation. Attending the latter was Dr. Lin Chiao-chin, a 71-year-old gynecologist who visited here in 1972.
